READING OF MINUTES: Regular/Virtual Meeting of Council – April 12, 2022

CORRESPONDENCE:

Mr. Chabut read a lengthy Email from Heather McCollister, 6008 Thunderbird Drive, dated April 23, 2022, regarding the proposed housing complexes on the corner of Andrews and Lake Shore Blvd and behind a Dollar General. Mrs. McCollister also voiced her concerns regarding the rudeness of Mr. Morris in the Community Page on Facebook. A copy of Mrs. McCollister's email is attached to these Minutes.

Mrs. Moore stated, in light of the conversations at recent Meetings, there has been a lot of talk about subsidized housing and Section 8 housing in the City. She reached out to Lake Metro Housing Authority, which is the Agency in charge of that program. She asked them specifically about the number of homes in the City, single family, multi-family, apartments, that participate in their program. Section 8 is a housing voucher program so they get a voucher for a house only, not an apartment. There are only six subsidized houses in Mentor-on-the-Lake. She also wanted to confirm with the apartment complexes if they did or did not take it, so she talked to all the managers and they all told her they do not accept Section 8 or other types of subsidies in this area.

Mrs. Moore read a lengthy Email she had also received from Heather McCollister, 6008 Thunderbird Drive, on April 23, 2022, regarding the rudeness and harshness of Mr. Morris' postings on the Community Page on Facebook. She stated he has been confrontational and it looks like he is trying to get people riled up; she feels calling people and Council out is not acceptable for a Council Person to do. A copy of Mrs. McCollister's Email is attached to these Minutes.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS:

Mayor & Safety Director – Mr. Eva

Mayor Eva swore in the two new full-time patrol officers for the Mentor-on-the-Lake Police Department, Brandon Hozian and Neil Tyrrell, they were both given a round of applause, and congratulated by Council.

Mayor Eva advised Part-Time Mentor-on-the-Lake Officer Dave Lombardo retired from the Police Department on April 23, 2022. He had worked for the Police Department for over 27 years. Mayor Eva wished Officer Lombardo and his family the best going forward.

At the appropriate time Mayor Eva stated he would like to schedule a Community Development Meeting for Monday, May 9, 2022, if that works. The purpose of the meeting would be to have the Sommers Group come in with their site plan and all of their information, and go over their proposal for the corner of Andrews and Lake Shore. By scheduling this meeting, he would like residents to come in. The Sommers Group can answer questions and there can be an open forum for the whole site plan. Mr. Johnson said let's make it a Council of the Whole Meeting.

Administrative Director – Mrs. Bartone (Absent)

Law Director – Mr. Lyons (No Report)

Fire Chief – Mr. Pechatsko

Chief Pechatsko said on April 9, 2022, the Fire Department held its annual Easter Egg Hunt, and despite the cold weather, there was a great turnout. He thanked the Firefighters and their families who came out to help.

Chief Pechatsko said on tonight's Agenda is Ordinance No. 2022-O-04 on Third Reading. He shared some facts relating to fireworks from the Consumers Products Safety Commission which support the passage of this Ordinance. He also shared facts from the NFPA. He believes this Ordinance is the best way to keep this community safe, and thanked the Ordinance Committee and all of Council for their support of this Ordinance.

QUESTIONS TO ADMINISTRATION AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

Mr. Morris said he had a couple of questions for Chief Pechatsko. Some time ago he talked to Battalion Chief Tom Konitsky about a bronzed helmet given to Chief Carl Weston upon his retirement that used to be in the front closet of the station. He said that helmet is missing in action, and asked if Chief Pechatsko knew what happened to it. Chief Pechatsko said he had no clue; he will look for it and get back to Mr. Morris, but he thought it was still in that front closet. The reason Mr. Morris said he asked is there is a small group that meet at the Library developing the history of Mentor-on-the-Lake, and they talked to the Library about developing a display case from Mentor-on-the-Lake's history.

Mr. Morris asked Chief Pechatsko if the firefighters still need to learn the streets in the City. He has witnessed on more than one occasion emergency vehicles taking the long way around to get to a scene. To him it indicates they are relying too much on GPS devices to get to a scene. Is that the case or do they still need to learn the streets? Chief Pechatsko said part of the squad certification is the maps test and the addresses. They do have some newer guys who may not have taken the most direct route or they might have just made a mistake, but yes, to answer his question, the maps test and the address test is part of the squad certification. Mr. Morris said he hopes it improves because quite honestly we spend hundreds of thousands of dollars to staff the station full time, to reduce response times, and to see the vehicles go in weird directions to get to a call is disheartening.

The last question Mr. Morris had for Chief Pechatsko is do the guys still do truck tests. Chief Pechatsko said they did. At the Southland fire he understands there was a delay in getting the hydrant hooked up because there was an adapter missing out of the hydrant pack. Was there an adapter missing that day? Chief Pechatsko said the hydrant he is talking about is a 2-1/2" two barrel which are few and far between in the City, so at that particular fire, the engine operator did have to go back to the truck and grab an adapter which did cause a slight delay, but that hydrant was also completely buried in snow and had to be dug out. That has been corrected.

BOARD/COMMITTEE/COMMISSION REPORTS:

Board of Zoning Appeals / April 18, 2022 / Mr. Lunder

Mr. Lunder stated the Board of Zoning Appeals meet on April 18, 2022 at 6:00 P.M. The purpose of the Meeting was a request for a variance at 5687 Beech Drive. Present were Ray Gieling, Mike Sweeney, Brandon Towns, Council Member Lunder, Council Vice-President Bittner, and Mayor Eva, and the homeowner, his wife and son were also there. The variance met all specifications and the variance was approved. The Meeting adjourned at 6:08 P.M.

Zoning Committee / April 20, 2022 / Mr. Chabut

Mr. Chabut stated the Zoning Committee met on April 20, 2022, at 7:00 P.M. The purpose of the Meeting was a review of the 1255 Lakefront Planned Unit Development District. Present were Council Member Chabut, Chair, Council Members Lunder, Morris, Moore, Council Vice-President Bittner, Mayor Eva, and 22 residents. Many residents as well as City Officials were in attendance and a lively discussion ensued. Some of the residents used this opportunity to voice their concerns. The Committee will review these comments and suggestions, and will endeavor to incorporate some of them into the Ordinance. Residents were encouraged to email him with any further suggestions they may have. The Meeting adjourned at 8:50 P.M.

OPEN TO THE PUBLIC TO SPEAK: 7:35 P.M.

David Scarnati, 7545 Salida Road. Mr. Scarnati thanked Zoning for hearing the community in a meeting. He asked for a clarification about what exactly a Second Reading or a Third Reading means, and being referred back to Committee on the PUD, does this mean it still continues on Second Reading. Mr. Lyons explained First, Second, and Third Readings. He had indicated to Council the PUD is currently in the Zoning Committee and it has to be taken back from the Zoning Committee by a vote of Council, then it would be read as a Second Reading at that time and they would have the ability to pass it by suspending the Rules. Suspending the Rules means it does not have to be read three times. If there is not a sufficient vote to suspend the Rules, it would go on Third Reading.

Earle Kurress, 7523 Salida Road. Mr. Kurress had further questions about the May 9th Community Development Meeting which he just heard about today. He would like more information, what time, what is it about, it is a formal meeting. He was told all of Council will be there now. Mr. Johnson said the meeting has not actual been set yet, there has just been a request to schedule one. As the Mayor indicated, the developer would like to come in and present some information to Council and the community as a whole. You will hear this later in the meeting once they schedule the date and time. Mr. Kurress asked if it was open to anybody. Mr. Johnson said all of our meetings are open to the public. Mr. Kurress asked if it would be a meet and greet type of thing. Mr. Johnson said it will be a presentation and then questions and answers. Mr. Lyons asked to elaborate on this and said the Mayor suggested it be a Community Development Meeting. Mr. Johnson said if all of Council will be there, why don't we do it as a Council of the Whole. Council has the right to set a meeting, not the City Council where they can pass legislation, but instead as a Committee of their entire membership to allow them to conduct meetings in a less formal manner. It is a notice meeting that is open to the public pursuant to the Sunshine Laws, minutes will be kept and approved. It is up to Council to determine if they want input from residents, but it is his understanding from the Mayor and Mr. Johnson that the developer is going to explain not only to Council but to anyone else who comes, what their plan is so as much information can be put out there as possible. No formal vote in terms of approval can be taken. It is for information purposes only. Mr. Scarnati asked if Council decides if it will allow questions and answers. Mr. Lyons said he did say that and he said that because technically the Committee sets its own rules but he does not think there is any chance at this particular meeting, due to the volume of questions that have been asked, that questions will not be allowed.

Tess Turi, 7373 Salida Road. Mrs. Turi asked about the phrase "declaring an emergency" that is on a lot of the legislation. Mr. Lyons explained there are two procedural things that happen with legislation. In order for Council to consider any legislation, it has to be read on three different occasions, plus five members of Council must vote to suspend the rules which means the legislation can go forward and be voted on. Declaring an emergency means once legislation is passed it immediately goes into effect rather than going into effect after thirty days. Five Members of Council are needed to approve legislation. Mr. Johnson said the legislation will go into effect if passed by Council and signed by the Mayor. If the Mayor does not approve of it, then it would have to be overridden by Council.

Scott Wilhelm, 7573 Salida Road. Mr. Wilhelm said they do appreciate the opportunity to hear a presentation by the Sommers Group. He is very appreciative that the fireworks Ordinance was approved this evening. As he has indicated, he is a surgeon at University Hospitals and a member of the Ohio Chapter of the American College of Surgeons. They just had a meeting in Cleveland, they had good support from Ohio Commission on Trauma, and he supports many of the statements made by Chief Pechatsko this evening. Lastly, they appreciated the opportunity to take part in the Zoning Committee Meeting. As Mr. Chabut mentioned, he specifically requested any comments from their group be sent to him. A group of the residents had the opportunity over the weekend to sit down and review the PUD, and they made some amended changes they put into a formal document which they will forward to Mr.

Chabut which should allow time for the Zoning Committee to review it, and if there are any questions, they will try to address them as much as possible as everyone's schedules allow, and then certainly have good attendance at the next Zoning Committee Meeting.



Good morning,

I am writing you in regards to Councilperson Paul Morris. I am honestly not sure how council works and who to address issues/concerns to but you are the council person at large for my ward so I thought I would start with you.

I am Heather McCollister at 6008 Thunderbird Dr. Luckily, Mr. Morris does NOT represent my ward. I was wondering if someone could address his rudeness over his posts on FaceBook on the Community of Mentor on the Lake page as a representative of our city. In several posts in relation to his position, not "personal" posts, he has been extremely rude. The last being approximately 14 hours ago to what I can tell is directed to a person who he is in fact a representative of their ward.

There is a way to address people or express things; however, I feel that he goes way too far. There is no reason to be rude and harsh as a councilperson. Saying people do not care about their city is in itself uncalled for as some people are unable to attend meetings for several and various reasons which could include inability to physically get there, anxiety issues, shyness, feeling that they will be degraded for speaking their minds like Paul Morris comes across as the type of "person" who would do this, and some citizens may still have CoVid fears as a lot of our residents are older. A lot of people do not understand how the government works either and feel that their voice would not matter or they would not be able to express themselves properly since they are not familiar with how it all works.

Coming on FaceBook and being snarky or telling someone that "I saw on your profile that you do not even live in our community any more. You live in Cleveland, so why do you care what goes on in our city? Are you hoping to move back to MOL?" as a response to being called out for a rude post is not right. After the person, who I have no clue who he is but looking I do see he lives on Fern in MOL responded that he has been here for over a decade and he is sorry for not updating his Facebook in a timely manner for Mr. Morris. Mr. Morris then comments "I would have thought that "over a decade" would have been plenty of time to correct your profile. I guess you aren't the type of person who rushes into anything!"

These comments, along with others he has made on this page, is not how a councilperson should be acting. This is very immature and appears as if he is just looking to rile people up. His posts and responses are what hold people back from

expressing concerns. As a representative of our city he should do better. If I replied to my customers, which in turn are his residents, in the way that he does and has I would be reprimanded.

This is NOT how you bring a community together nor is it how you get your residents to want to attend meetings or express concerns. This particular person he is commenting with appears to be part of HIS ward! This is how you reply and treat someone that you are supposed to be standing up for and representing on your behalf?

Someone should let Mr. Morris know that what is on FaceBook is not always true, such as the locations that people put in their profiles. That this day in age, people tend to not want their locations out there for the public to see. At one point I put I lived in Alaska, is it true, NO. I have lived in MOL whether growing up or now with my family for over 30 years as has my husband.

He has also been very confrontational on another post too about the complex proposed for the old Yagers location and made his post appear that not only the Mayor but the council have tried to be deceitful. This does not look good at all and only causes alarm and uncertainty within our community.

There is a way to announce upcoming council meetings and agendas when you are a representative of the city and he is not doing it correctly nor as a representative of our city should be.

I understand freedom of speech, and he has this on his own personal page, but when you come on a page meant for the community and are rude you are now acting as a person on a council for the city and a representative of the city. Either he needs to learn how to properly address items on social media or he should refrain from posting on anything other than his own personal page. Calling people and council out and being flat out rude is unacceptable for a council person to do, everyone working for a company knows that you are always a reflection of your company.

His posts and responses come off as being intimidating and that is not right.

Proposed housing complexes on corner of Andrews and Lake Shore Blvd and behind a Dollar General

Good Morning Mr. Chabut,

I am reaching out to you as a concerned homeowner on behalf of myself and my parents. I have lived at 6008 Thunderbird Dr for 8 years and my parents, Bill and Chris Holmes, live at 7430 Goldenrod Dr and have for over 40 years. I have lived in Mentor on the Lake most of my life either with my parents growing up or with my family of 4 now.

I have major concerns rezoning these parcels into residential. I know a resident of Cedarwood stood up at a council meeting a few weeks ago stating that it does not really affect someone living on Thunderbird and he is incorrect. It may not affect Cedarwood/Firwood/Maplewood; however, it would greatly affect Thunderbird as it does Salida. Thunderbird gets the Salida traffic as they get Thunderbird's traffic. Salida and Thunderbird are easy access to get to Andrews from and to Lakeshore. Within the last few years Thunderbird has seen a much larger amount of traffic and most of them driving at a high rate of speed, but that is another topic. Allowing multi-family units, whether it be apartments/townhouses/condos will only increase that traffic considerably as people want to avoid the traffic light on both Reynolds and Campbell. They come off Lakeshore to Maplewood (only the first 1/4 of it) turn down Thunderbird and only have a few stop signs to get to Salida and vice versa while heading up Salida, to Thunderbird to the 1/4 part of Maplewood to Lakeshore. So, yes it does not affect us as far as having the complexes in our backyard it does affect us in the long run with heavy traffic. It would not affect the guy who lives on Cedarwood as taking Cedarwood off of Lakeshore would be a longer route to get to Salida. People will generally take this backway instead of going up Lakeshore to the light to turn on Andrews as it is much more congested up that way and then you have to wait to turn onto Andrews which is very congested. That is another point as to why we do not need more complexes on Andrews, more people way more congestion up from Fern to Lakeshore in our little shopping district.

Another major concern of mine is that we do not have the police or rescue force to handle so many more additional bodies in our city. In my opinion, we are very short staffed in these areas. We have only a limited amount of full time patrol officers now with what we have. By creating multi-person units we will need more full time officers or the services needed by our current residents will not be met.

If we zone these areas as residential, my understanding is in the future we are opening the potential up of them becoming low income housing and section 8. Statistics show that with this type of housing we have a greater chance of bringing crime in our little community. Right now, we do have crime already but residents still feel a sense of some safety if we bring in more opportunities we will lose our sense of safety which is one of the reasons why we bought here and not in Mentor. I already know that if it is passed to approve these locations as residential, I will be looking into options in other cities to move my family to. I did not move here to be overcrowded and live in a mini Cleveland/Painesville area where you are concerned with not feeling comfortable leaving a front door open or being in your yard.

I am not against businesses being opened, even a Dollar General, because that is what those areas are zoned for currently and those too will bring in revenue to our city. There is not much that can be done if a business wants to build in our city and they meet the zoning requirements, and I understand that. This does not make me feel unsafe in our community as multi-family units would.

We have a lot of multi-family housing units on Andrews as is and on Sharon Drive. Looking at these units, they have gone downhill from 20 years ago and have drawn in some shady characters. They all looked great and beautiful 20 years ago but now they are no longer upkept and some are starting to become an eyesore. Everyone knows the one on the side of Giant Eagle behind the Ale House is not an upstanding complex, I am sure big promises were made when that one was built too but now it is known for nothing but trouble. This is where these new developments will be in another 10 years as well.

Is there also not a reason why the city does not go in and clean the Judges property where the former Yagers was and attach that onto her tax bill as a lien? If it were a resident, this would have been done. She has boats sitting there still and one is without a trailer laying on its side. This makes our city look like trash and just because she is/was a judge is no excuse why she should not be penalized with this with liens tacked on her. If a boat without a trailer was on its side in a

residents yard after warnings it would be removed by our city and we would be penalized, is this because she is/was a judge? This property has always been an eyesore.

In a nutshell, my husband and myself and my mother and father are concerned with the violence these complexes could bring to our city with them and for my husband and myself the extra unneeded traffic on Thunderbird. We do NOT have the police force that would be able to handle this amount of bodies within our city. Our police force does an excellent job now, but there is absolutely no way our ER forces as it stands could take care of our city and its residents like they do now if we add more multi-person units to our city. These units will create, if not now then eventually, more crimes within our city.

Neither my family nor my parents verbally express this in council meetings as we are not comfortable standing up in front of others and talking and I also personally am not confident with how council and how it works to do it, so we are expressing our concerns via email. Unlike what Mr. Paul Morris spews on FaceBook on the The Community Page, it is not that people do not care, it is that some are not comfortable addressing crowds or being in crowds or they do not understand how council works to be comfortable expressing their opinions in fear of coming across as feeling inadequate. But his rudeness is a whole other story and we are very grateful that he is not the voice for our areas.
